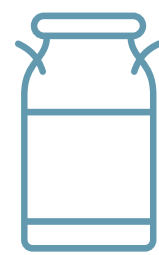

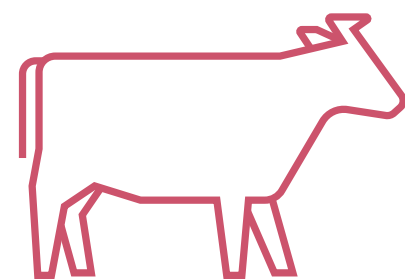

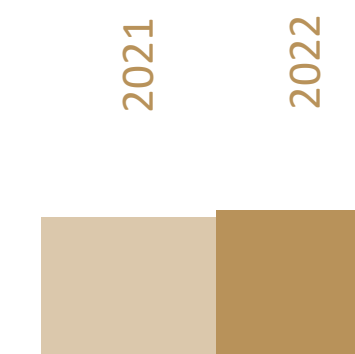

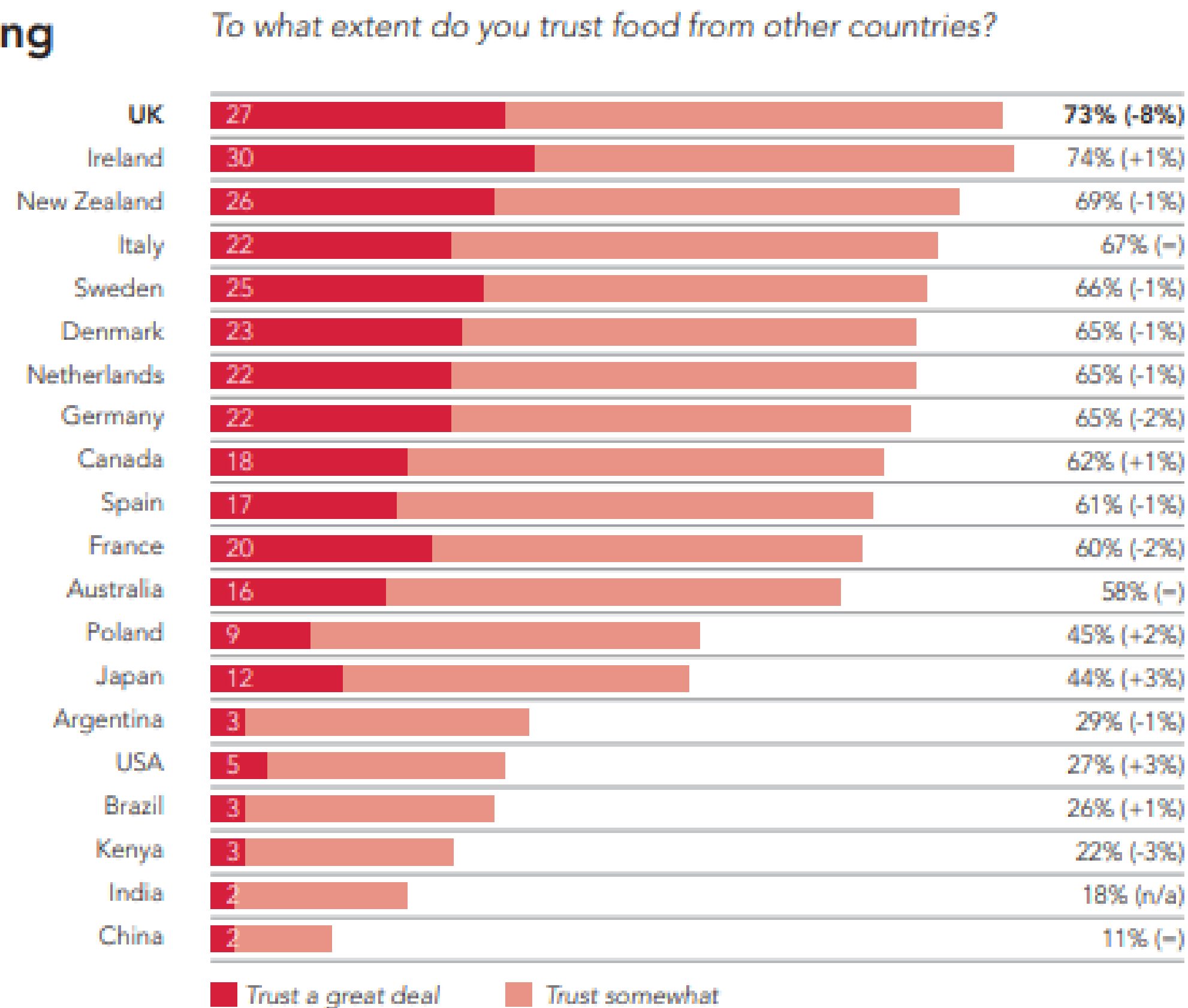

Customs changes for Irish exports to the UK from October 2024

- The UK's Border Target Operating Model (BTOM) will impact on Irish exporters and their supply chain partners.

31 January 2024

- Full customs controls will be introduced for goods moving from Ireland into GB ports.
- UK import declarations will need to be pre-lodged and goods moved from the island of Ireland will become subject to checks and controls.

Begin preparation with supply chain now

- Pre-lodged declarations will be entered in Goods Vehicle Movement Service (GVMS).
 - Need to get a UK Government account to be able to use GVMS,
 - need all the MRNs to put in to the GVMS,
 - May not be allowed to board ferry in IE for GB without the unique Goods Movement Reference (GMR) assigned by GVMS
 - Routings will be for the full truck and will be cognisant of SPS requirements.
 - Routings direct through GVMS or using the look-up functionality

Timelines UK SPS Import Controls

31 January 2024

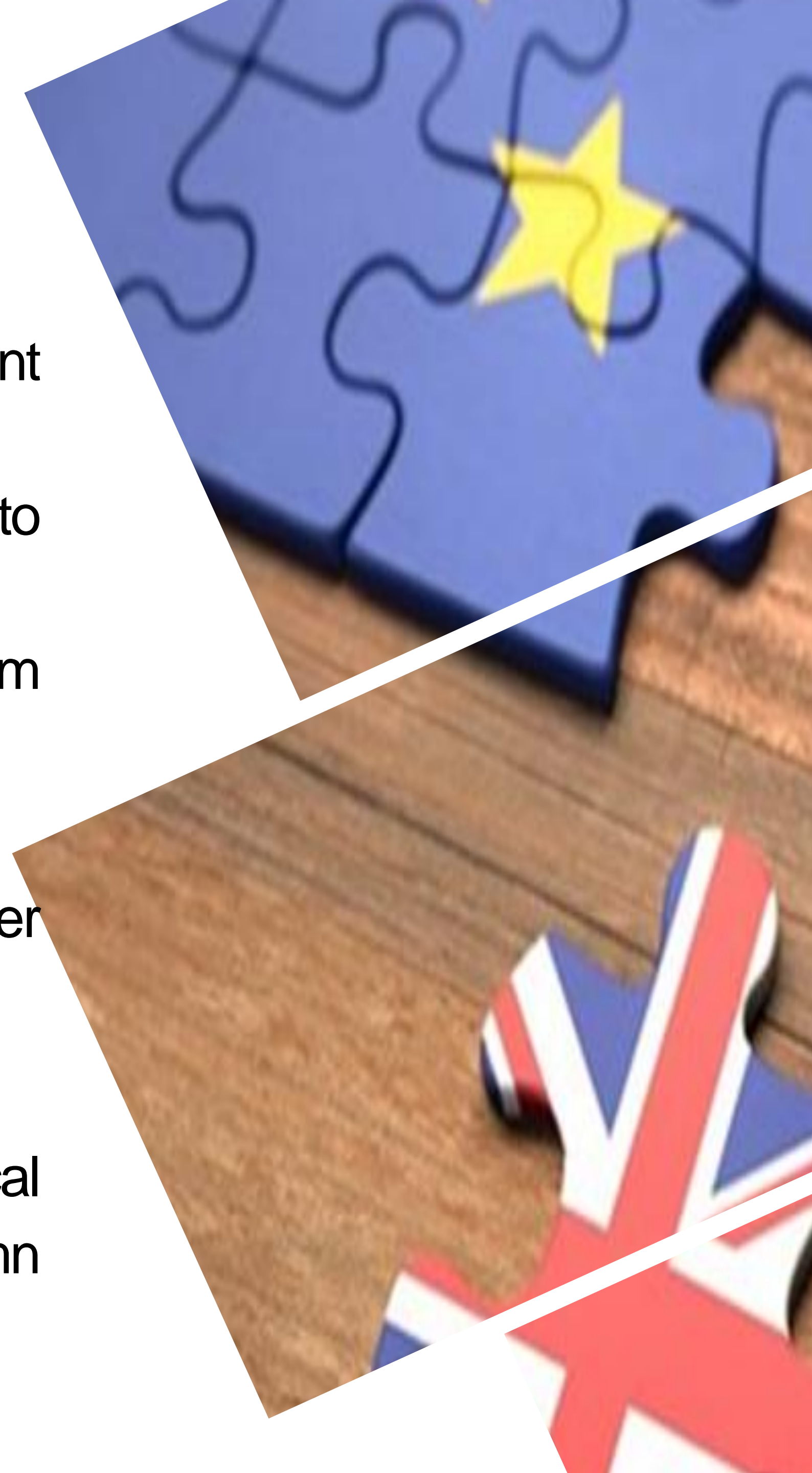
- **Export Health certification** for medium risk animal products, plants, plant products and high-risk food and feed of non-animal origin from the EU.
- **IPAFFs pre-notification** required for SPS goods traveling from Ireland to Great Britain. In place for the rest of the EU since 2022.
- No requirement for pre notification for low-risk plant and plant products from the EU.

30 April 2024

- Documentary and risk-based identity and physical checks at UK Border Control Posts (BCPs) for SPS goods from the EU **excluding Ireland**.

31 October 2024

- Date for commencement of Border Control Post (BCP) identity and physical checks for SPS goods moving from Ireland will be confirmed in Autumn 2023 but will not apply before 31 October 2024.

Composite Products

What are Composite Products (CP)? Commission Decision 2007/275/EC definition of Composite Products retained by UK:

*“a foodstuff intended for human consumption that contains both processed products of animal origin and products of plant origin and includes those where the **processing of primary product** is an Integral part of the production of the final product”.*

Composite Products from EU designated by UK as Low Risk:

- Pre-notification on IPAFFS: YES
- Export Health Certification : NO

Clarifications in Final UK Border Target Operating Model

Transit/Landbridge Movements of SPS goods

For Animals and animal products transiting GB landbridge:

- **High, medium and low risk** animals & animal products transiting GB **will require pre-notification** via IPAFFS.
- **High risk & Medium risk** animals & animal products will also require a **transit export health certificate**.
- **High risk & Medium risk** animals & animal products will be subject to entry and exit identity and physical checks at UK Border Control Posts (BCPs) at a date TBC by UK Government, for goods from Ireland this will not commence before 31 October 2024.
- **Low risk** animals & animal products will not require health certificates or be subject to routine checks at UK BCPs. However, they may be subject to non-routine/intelligence-led checks by UK Authorities.

For Plants and plant products transiting GB landbridge

- **NO** requirement for pre-notification via IPAFFS or phytosanitary certification for high, medium or low risk plant product transiting GB.
- Plant Products transiting GB will continue to require a signed declaration stating that the goods are under phytosanitary transit and are packaged in such a way that there is no risk to spreading pests through GB.

Clarifications in Final UK Border Target Operating Model

- **Chilled Meat Preparations:** From 31 January 2024 Chilled Meat Preparations will continue to be permitted for import from EU to GB and will be classified as 'medium risk'. They will require an Export Health Certificate (EHC) to enter Great Britain & prenotification on IPAFFS.
- **Export of samples:** Commercial movements of Animal products and plant and plant products samples will align with the commercial import of goods outlined within the BTOM, same requirements based on risk category of product. Some different requirements for animal by products samples, paragraphs 134-137 of BTOM, further clarity needed from UK authorities.
- **Personal imports, including luggage, post and parcels**

UK Authorities in BTOM have committed to publishing at a later date import control policy for small consignments of animal products intended for personal use (B2C and C2C).

Business-to-business post and parcels will be subject to general commercial import requirements.

Key Messages - Get Ready



1

Identify if you need certification for your products to GB

- Is your product in UK's medium risk category?
- If so, identify the right export health cert(s) for your products.

2

Examine your supply chain, know who is responsible for meeting each UK import requirement

- Who completes pre-notification declaration on UK IPAFFS system?
- If your food business is exporting low, medium or high risk products of animal origin to GB are you registered on the Lists of Establishments Approved to Export to GB on EU TRACES system?
- Who applies for export health certification and ensures certificate/s is uploaded IPAFFS?

ENGAGE with your local Supervisory team (*DAFM, HSE, Local Authority, SFPA*)

- To confirm what health certification you need for your products?
- Can your business fulfil the attestations on the required UK export health certificate?
- Ensure all necessary data and information is available to your certifying officer to allow them to sign the certificate.
- Ensure business processes and resources are aligned to support certification

Department of Agriculture, Food & the Marine (DAFM) preparations for new UK SPS requirements



- Engagement with UK authorities to clarify detail of new UK import requirements
- Review of new UK export health certificates and requirements and review of the business processes to support food businesses in meeting these requirements.
- Engagement between local DAFM supervisory teams and food businesses to refine business processes across all commodity areas.

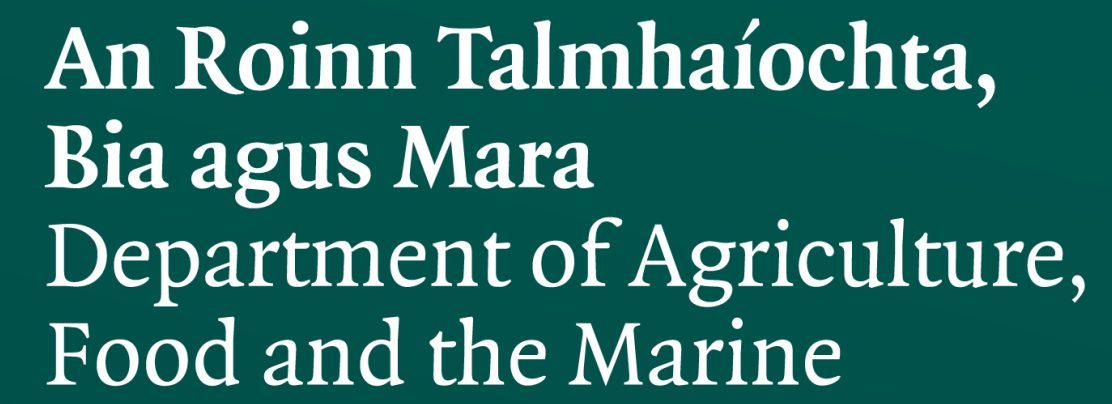

Commodity	TOM risk category	Comments
POAO that are shelf stable at ambient temperature	Low (if it meets the listed criteria)	The product is low risk if it meets all of the criteria listed below the table.

Products of animal origin (POAO)

A POAO commodity will be in the low TOM risk category if it meets all of the following criteria:

- it is shelf-stable at ambient temperature
- it has undergone a treatment step or other processing in its manufacture (for example, canning) to eliminate or reduce micro-organisms of concern to an acceptable level
- it is clearly identified as intended for human consumption
- it is securely packaged or sealed in visibly clean containers
- it is labelled in English and accompanied by a commercial document providing information on the nature of the commodity, the quantity and number of packages, the country of origin, the manufacturer and the ingredients
- it is not infant formula or follow-on formula, baby food, or food for special medical purposes
